Highway Commissioner Jerry Meyer To Retire

Road Commissioner Jerry Meyer is retiring after serving as Washington Township Highway Commissioner for nearly 29 years. Jerry started working for the Road District in 1989, working under former Highway Commissioner Clarence Bunte. Meyer was appointed as Highway Commissioner on December 2, 1991.

During Meyer's time as Highway Commissioner, he was the General Contractor for the Washington Township Center, converted over 20 miles of dirt or gravel roads to tar and chip, and upgraded over 20 miles to asphalt. He helped create the Joint Fuel System with the Beecher Police and Fire Departments along with the Beecher School District. Over the last twenty years, he has worked closely with neighboring townships, sharing equipment and labor to help get road projects done correctly and economically.

Township Offers Early Voting for Upcoming Elections

A Few Interesting Points Regarding Township Roads

Beecher is within Washington Township. The village is responsible for the roads within the village limits and the township is responsible for the roads in the unincorporated area.

There are 72 miles of roads in unincorporated Washington Township, which is the third most of any township in Will County.

The Road District recently resurfaced two miles of Ashland Avenue with asphalt at a cost of \$264,000. At \$132,000 per mile, it would cost \$9.5 million to resurface all the roads in the township. The Road District only receives approximately \$580,000 a year in tax dollars, using that total, it would take 16 years to resurface every road and that's if you spent the entire levy on roads, which isn't feasible, because the district also must pay for labor, insurance, equipment, materials, repairs, fuel, supplies, building utilities and the list goes on.

Making things more challenging, is most of the original roads built in Washington Township were not built with an adequate road base. Several roads actually started out as "mud roads" and were never intended to be used as through roads to get from point A to point B, they were built for farmers to get to their fields. Over the last several years, the Road District has had to completely "dig up" sections of roads and install a new 12" stone base before any type of hard surface can be applied. At the same time, drainage and ditches must be updated as well. Depending on how many miles of road are being improved, this process can take up to two years and requires hundreds of hours or labor and thousands of tons of stone. Unfortunately, current funding only allows for so much to be done at any given time.

The Road District is working within their means to keep our roads in good condition.

What About the Airport?

There has been discussion about a 3rd airport since the mid 1980's and to date the project has gone through a series of taking steps forward and then falling back. According to an article in the Chicago Tribune, dated 8/12/19, the state owns 5,000 acres of the 6,000 acres they need for the "inaugural footprint". According to the Assessor's office, only 102 acres of this property is within Washington Township. A law passed in 2019 also requires the state to pay Will County, and in turn the affected townships, real estate taxes on this property, this provision will expire in 2030.

From Assessor Mary Tamez...

"In the midst of chaos, there is also opportunity..." Sun Tsu

Life has been different everywhere throughout these last few months. I have been handling business with our township residents through social distancing with a few months of it working from my home. With the extra time on our hands, many have taken the time to investigate things that we have left on the back burner. One of them being their property tax bill.

I have had the privilege of speaking with and getting to know so many of you throughout the last few years. We have worked through so many things together but one of the most common questions being: "How can I lower my tax bill?"

Your taxes are based on a Tax Rate that is applied to the Equalized Assessed Value of your home. My office is responsible for that value. Take the steps below to ensure that you are paying your fair share of property tax.

First, how is the market value determined?

Market data - Similar, neighboring properties that have sold in the last three years are compared to the property being assessed.

Cost – The cost to reproduce (or rebuild) the property minus the amount for depreciation (e.g., wear and tear, age) plus the land value.

Using this information, I can place a market value on your property. The assessor values your residential land, your home, and farm buildings. The farmland is determined at the County level based on soil types. Your assessment is 33.33% of the market.

<u>Second, a multiplier is added to the assessment every year based on the market. What will happen to my assessment based on the 2020 market? How is this determined?</u>

Will County is required by the Illinois Department of Revenue to use a three-year Sales Study for assessments, which is a retrospective value. That means township assessors look at 2017, 2018, and 2019 sales when determining 2020 assessments. What you can do is make sure your property characteristics are accurate. For example: square footage, number of bathrooms, full basements, etc. If you find an inaccuracy, contact my office immediately.

Pay attention to what homes sell for in your area. Look into the market value of your home to make sure you feel the home is not over assessed!

Third, make sure you are getting the exemptions you are entitled to.

Review the right column of your current tax bill to confirm your exemptions. Exemptions that are available:

- ♦ General Homestead
- ♦ Senior Homestead
- ♦ Senior Homestead Assessment Freeze
- Disabled Person
- ♦ Disabled Veteran

It is the homeowner's responsibility to apply for all exemptions. I suggest you check this annually to ensure the savings are applied that you deserve!

I have appreciated getting to know and work with so many of you. I have also taken this time to look inward, reflect on what truly matters, and connect with myself and my loved ones on a deeper level and I encourage you to do the same. Learning to appreciate time and dealing with the unknown is something that I hope we all have been able grow with as humans. Stay healthy. Take heart. Take care of each other. Fear and pain have been in so much of our life lately. Let's let love help us find our way out.

News From the Community Building Board of Managers

During the past 3 ½ years, the Washington Township Community Hall Board of Managers has been working hard to accomplish many projects to improve and restore the Community Hall: installing a new roof to prevent further water damage, working with ComEd to retrofit all the fluorescent lighting to LED, painting of the entire interior of the building, replacing the broken block windows upstairs, rebuilding the crumbling brick façade on the front of the building, replacing the worn and rusted exterior doors, refinishing the wooden floors upstairs and installing a new water fountain with bottle filler. But perhaps one of our biggest accomplishments was to have an ADA compliant incline platform lift installed to allow full access to all levels for anyone that is physically challenged. Once we receive final approval from the State Fire Marshall, the lift will be fully operational. And it is important to note that all of these projects were completed well within budget so no additional funds were required.

But we haven't finished yet! Since the Community Hall, and the many programs and activities it hosts, benefits directly from use of the parking lot, we will be entering into an inter-governmental agreement with the Village of Beecher and the Beecher Fire Protection District to repair and upgrade the parking lot to the west of the building once renovations to the fire station are completed. We have also begun the process of getting bids and estimates for replacing all the sidewalks around the building and restructuring the main entrance to provide a larger platform and install ramp access. We will also be updating the landscaping around the building.

During these uncertain times, the Community Hall will also be offering a discounted rental rate for any residents of Washington Township for the months of October, November and December. Instead of the usual \$125 rate per day per level, it will be reduced to \$75 per day per level. We encourage anyone interested in seeing the building or reserving a date to contact Kellie Karstensen, Community Hall Manager at 708-417-6403 to check availability and details.

Winter Tips for Seniors

A single fall can cause debilitating and costly injuries, but a few simple tips can help older adults stay safe and healthy through the winter months.

1. Tread carefully

To help avoid falls, wear appropriate shoes outdoors and put road salt, sand or kitty litter on sidewalks and driveways.

2. Avoid overwork

Find someone to handle snow shoveling and other strenuous outdoor tasks.

3. Exercise indoors

Staying indoors does not mean being inactive. Keep in shape by walking in place, using a stationary bike or working out with a fitness video, available at the local library.

4. Bundle up

Cold temperatures are a serious threat to seniors. Wear layers!

5. Keep the heat on

Inadequate indoor heat also can cause hypothermia. Keep home temperatures above 65 degrees and dress in layers to maintain body temperature.

6. Clear the air

If you heat your home with a fireplace, gas furnace or gas-powered space heater, invest in carbon monoxide detectors, which can be purchased at a home improvement store for as little as \$30.

7. Socialize

Depression is more common in the winter months, make efforts to spend time with family, friends and neighbors, and when weather makes visiting difficult, pick up the phone for a chat.

Beecher Fire Protection District - Fire Prevention Bureau Frequently Asked Questions

What is a fire inspection?

A fire inspection is a comprehensive look inside and outside of an occupancy for potential items that could cause a fire or a potential life safety hazard.

How often do fire inspections occur?

Fire inspections occur a minimum of once per year, unless there is a need to inspect a premise more often. A public concern would be one of those times. A person calls in a concern about a premise, the fire inspector may visit the premise to investigate and determine if further action by the bureau may be warranted.

Does the fire inspector just show up?

The fire inspector may or may not make an appointment with the premise. For larger premises, premises that have fluctuating hours, and premises that may have a high customer load, the fire inspector will call for an appointment. Smaller premises the fire inspector may not make an appointment due to time constraints. The fire inspector will do their best to minimize the effect on day to day operations.

Can I refuse to have an inspection?

If business at the time prevents you from meeting with the fire inspector, then you can refuse the inspection at that time and request the fire inspector make an appointment for a later time. That does not mean you can refuse an inspection all together. All commercial, industrial, or multi-family occupancies within the Village of Beecher and unincorporated areas protected by the Beecher Fire Protection District must have an annual fire inspection.

How long does a fire inspection take?

Depending on the size of the occupancy the inspection can take as little as 15 minutes or up to an hour.

What does the fire inspector look for during an inspection?

The fire inspector is looking for items that may be considered a life safety issue or a fire risk.

Some examples include:

- Blocked exits. Exits must have a clear path of travel to the exit door
- Locked exits. Exits may be locked during normal business hours; however, the lock must be able to be opened without a key. In other words, a thumb latch or panic hardware must be installed on the inside of the occupancy.
- Extension cords. Extension cords generally are not permitted; the inspector will let you know if the extension is acceptable.
- Exit lights and emergency lights. The fire inspector will test all the exit and emergency lights to make sure they are working properly.
- Fire extinguishers. All occupancies must have at least one extinguisher. That extinguisher needs to be hung and serviced by a fire extinguisher company at least once per year and have a tag certifying when it was done affixed to the extinguisher.
- ♦ Fire alarm and hood and duct systems. Any occupancy that has a fire alarm system, if it's a combination system with a burglar or a stand-alone system; must have the system serviced by a licensed fire alarm company once per year and the system must be tagged like a fire extinguisher. If the occupancy has a hood and duct system, that system must be serviced and cleaned every six months by a licensed company. The results of the service must be uploaded by the company to www.thecomplianceengine.com The Compliance Engine is a third-party tracking company that monitors the servicing of all fire protection systems for the district.
- Sprinkler systems and fire pumps. The inspector will check to see if the sprinkler system and fire pumps have been serviced on an annual basis by a licensed company. The findings of the service must be uploaded to the <u>www.thecomplianceengine.com</u>



Beecher Fire Protection District - Fire Prevention Bureau Frequently Asked Questions - cont.

What code does the Fire District use?

The Village of Beecher has adopted the International Fire Code (IFC) 2015 edition, NFPA 101 and the International Building Code (IBC) 2015. The Fire District will use those codes within the village boundaries. The Fire District has adopted the same codes for use in the unincorporated areas of the county within the boundaries of the Fire District.

I'm opening a new business in town; do I need an inspection?

Yes, when a new business opens, a final occupancy inspection by the Fire District must be completed. This is to ensure the business has all of the required fire and life safety protections in place.

I want to put a fire protection system in my business what do I need to do?

Plans of the system must be submitted to the Fire District for review and approval. The plans must be done by a licensed engineer. Plans can be submitted electronically or by paper.

Is there a charge for the plan review?

Currently, there is no charge for a plan review from the Fire District within the Village limits.

<u>Is there a permit fee for installing an alarm or sprinkler system?</u>

Currently, the Fire District does not charge a permit fee for installing a sprinkler system.

Its Harvest Season - Safety Tips for Sharing the Road with Our Farming Community

Washington Township is an agricultural township with hundreds of farms within our boundaries. We thank our farmers for all they do to feed our nation and ask everyone to use caution during the harvest season. Farming equipment has become much larger over the years and according to the National Safety Council, approximately **33%** of fatal tractor accidents occur on public roads. In order to decrease the chance of a collision, motorists should follow these six rules of the road:

- 1. Slow down when you see a piece of agricultural equipment.
- 2. Watch for Slow-Moving-Vehicle (SMV) signs.
- 3. Watch for hand signals.
- 4. Pass farm equipment cautiously.
- 5. Watch for flashing amber lights.
- 6. Remember that agricultural operators have a right to drive their equipment on the road and during harvest season, are sometimes out late at NIGHT!

Please be alert and exercise patience when driving near or passing farm equipment on the roadway. Help us to make this year's harvest season a safe one!
